Pippa Park Raises Her Game Virtual Author Program from Erin Yun

Presentation for 5th-7th graders, Ages 9-12 | Time: 30 minutes, plus Q&A

About the Book: Pippa Park Raises Her Game by Erin Yun

In this critically acclaimed reimagining of *Great Expectations*, Erin Yun's writing captures the typical middle grade experience with everyone's new favorite heroine, Pippa Park.

Writing Workshop Description:

Erin Yun will discuss the following during the interactive workshop:

- How to develop a story using classic stories and defining fractured classics and retellings
- How to find inspiration in life experiences to create authentic characters
- How to develop the point of view for the book and characters

Introduction: Writing Workshop Goals and Author Erin Yun

Erin touches upon how she became an author. She focuses on why reading is the most valuable tool for writers and what the students will learn at the workshop.

Section One: Fractured Classics and the Difference Between Inspiration and Plagiarism

Erin starts off with a brief summary of a fractured classic with examples. She briefly explores the logistics behind retellings—what is the difference between being inspired by and plagiarizing someone's work? This section touches on copyright laws and the public domain.

Section Two: Creating a Character

Erin discusses how *Pippa Park Raises Her Game* was inspired by *Great Expectations* by highlighting the similarities and differences between her novel and Dickens's. (For example, there was no social media in Dickens's time, but the unfriendly love interest remains the same.) Next, she delves into the personal inspiration for the book, including Korean food, personality tests, playlists, and references to Korean dramas, with many visuals throughout. In this section, Erin gives tips on how to create your own character.

Section Three: Point of View

This section introduces students to first-, second-, and third-person point of view with examples to illustrate each point of view. Erin discusses why she chose to write in the first person for *Pippa Park Raises Her Game*.

Section Four: Creating Your Own Retelling (Interactive Section)

In this interactive section, Erin helps students create their own retellings. She encourages kids to find their own angles when approaching a retelling before walking them through the steps to write their own retellings, including: brainstorming source material, finding which elements of the story to keep and which to change, developing the main character, and choosing a point of view.

Conclusion: Takeaways and Author Program Worksheet

Students can recall the key points using the takeaway slide and take the first steps in creating their own retelling by downloading the printable worksheet.
